Kindergarten have had a wonderful start to Term 3! This term is a busy one - we have already had Education Week and the colour run and look forward to all the other fun events that are scheduled for the rest of the term.

It was lovely to be able to welcome our community back into our classrooms as part of Education Week. Thank you to all our parents, grandparents and carers who were able to take the time to visit and play some games that we regularly use to support learning in Kindy. It was also great to see you for the colour run! Students had so much fun running the course and getting covered in colour. We appreciate the P&C and teachers efforts for organising this event.

Kindergarten students continue to read and write everyday to develop early Literacy skills. We use quality picture books, both fiction and non-fiction to support students learning. You may like to ask your students what they have learnt about chickens, as we have just finished our informative writing unit. During Guided Reading each day, students work in groups to complete different activities that target their reading goals. We love reading with our students, it's one of our favourite parts of the day! Now that we are feeling confident with recognising numbers, Kindy are practising addition and subtraction strategies as part of our Mathematics lessons. To support their understanding of these concepts we use lots of concrete materials such as dice and cards, and play engaging interactive games on the iPad. Kindy use a QR code to access these games and can choose the appropriate level to ensure that they are always challenged. We also enjoy using the app SeeSaw to demonstrate our understanding during measurement lessons that explore concepts such as length, mass and capacity.

Kindy also love our weekly Creative Arts sessions where students experiment with different art techniques and materials. We provide a mixture of directed drawing activities as well as free art, where students have the freedom to express their creativity. We are impressed with how much our drawing skills have improved and having our artworks proudly displayed in our classroom makes us happy! Please enjoy some of the pictures of their artwork we have shared!

KM

Welcome back to Term 3!

We have successfully celebrated over 100 days of learning. In KM we are excited to be back and are ready to continue our learning journey.

English

In speaking and listening we are learning to express ourselves using full sentences during class discussions. In reading we are continuing to enjoy our reading groups where we are enjoying a variety of different texts to assist us with strategies to improve our comprehension skills by answering questions about what we have been reading. In writing we are practicing our handwriting skills to form sentences using capital letters, finger spaces between our words and using the correct punctuation at the end of a sentence e.g., full stop.

Mathematics

During this term we have been exploring mathematical problems and developing fluency with mathematical ideas. We use everyday language, concrete materials, and informal recordings to demonstrate our understanding using our whiteboards and the IWB. As part of our morning routine, we learn about the months, seasons, days of the week, use of calendars and clocks. Each day we have been challenging ourselves to guess what the daily temperature is by predicting whether it is higher or lower than the day before. We have been developing our addition strategies and are beginning to use the strategy of counting on from our starting number e.g., 5 + 6, we start counting on from 5 and add 6 rather than going back to one. Also, we are very clever at creating patterns and can predict which is the missing part in a pattern.

Science/Geography

In science this term we are discovering our physical world by experimenting and observing how everyday objects move. We have already uncovered and described items in our classroom and can describe whether they roll, slide, push or pull.


In geography we are investigating the unit People Live in Places. This unit is taught during our RFF. This unit will explore the places we live and belong to.

PDHPE/CAPA

During our YCDI lessons this term we are concentrating on Confidence and Persistence. During our weekly lessons we are learning what does it means to be confident and the skills we need to feel and act confident.

Each week we participate in the Westmead Feelings program to assist us with our emotional regulation and to be able to communicate how it feels using our scale 0-3. Each Friday we participate in sport. This term we have loads of fun using a giant parachute and jumping in sacks (trying not to fall over!) and are super excited to be participating in our first school carnival in Week 5. Every Tuesday we are excited to be getting our dancing shoes on each week during Groove Nation where we are learning dance sequences. Already this term we have opportunities to celebrate Education Week by dressing up in who we want to be when we grow up. The highlight of the term was the Colour Run where we had loads of fun going through and under all the obstacles and being splashed with coloured powder and enjoying an ice block at the end.

News from the Stage 1 Classrooms

Welcome back families, it is great to see Stage 1 students back in the classroom ready to learn with their friends and teachers.

This term students in Stage 1 have been and will continue to participate in CAPA groups focusing on music, dance, visual arts, and drama. Students get to engage in a twoweek cycle to focus on each of the elements of creative and practical arts.

In visual art, students are creating Ned Kelly artworks inspired by the artist, Sidney Nolan. Students are involved in appreciating and understanding the artist to recreate their own art works.

In dance, students are creating and performing a dance sequence using song lyrics and incorporating the various elements of dance such as high, medium, and low-level movements.

In drama, students have been recreating scenes from the book *Magic Beach* by Alison Lester. Students are dramatizing the words from the book through movement by working cooperatively in groups.

In music, students are learning the musical concepts of duration – beat and rhythm through various songs with Mr Clickety Cane being a favourite.

During writing this term students are composing different types of informative texts. These include descriptive writing, procedural text, and information reports. The students have really enjoyed the hands-on learning experiences, putting their procedures to the test by making their own fairy bread.

Volcanoes, Volcanoes, Volcanoes!!

This term, we are learning about information reports in writing and geological changes and extreme weather in science. This lends itself to the perfect match to link reading, writing and science to increase student knowledge and engagement in different areas of learning. For the past few weeks, our topic has been volcanoes. In writing, we wrote information reports about volcanoes, researching and including information about what they are, what happens when they erupt, what they look, feel and sound like and where we find them. In science we discussed the positive and negative effects they can have on the Earth's surface. Did you know that the soil around volcanoes is very good for growing crops due to the minerals found in volcanic ash. We do! We even made our own volcanic eruption using baking powder, vinegar and dish soap. We compared eruptions for composite and shield volcanoes by using a bottle with a small opening at the top like a composite volcano and a jug with a large opening like a shield volcano. In reading, we read informative and imaginative texts about volcanoes and were able to make connections to what we're learning in science and use the information we read in our writing.

Lava is molten rock that is thousands of degrees celcius that turns back into rock when it cools down



Volcano facts

Hore than 80% of the earth's surface is volcanic in origin. The sea floor and some mountains were formed by countless volcanic eruptions. Gaseous emissions from volcano formed the earth's atmosphere. There are more than 500 active volcanoes in the world.

How old is the first volcano?

The oldest lava flows found on Earth, near the village of Inukjuak, on the shore of Hudson Bay in Canada, are 8.825 ars old.13 Nov 2015 n ya Mauna Loa

Rising gradually to more than 4 km (2.5 mi) above sea level, **Hawall's Meuna Gea** is the targest active volcano on our planet. Its submarine flanks descend to the sea floor an additional 5 km (3 mi), and the sea floor in turn is depressed by Mauna Lea's great mass another 8 km (5 mi).

What volcano can destroy the world?

The **Yellowstone supervolcano** is a natural disaster that we cannot prepare for, it would bring the world to its knees and destroy tife as we know it. Sydney Edible Garden Grant - Winner!



The Sydney Edible Garden Trail, is a once a year urban edible garden trail run throughout Metropolitan Sydney, celebrating the many ways that Sydney residents are creating food security, building self-reliance, saving money and the environment, while enjoying the health benefits of homegrown fruit and veg. Their aim is to encourage and inspire growing edible produce in street gardens, home gardens and public spaces across Sydney. The SEGT is a volunteer-run, community not-for-profit event and the profits from the event are used to give back to the community through a grants program.

Each year, after the completion of their open garden event, school and community gardens in the Greater Sydney Region can apply for a grant to start an edible garden or improve an

existing one. With a tip off from a member of our school community (thanks Mandy!) **PNPS applied for a grant to start our own veggie garden.... And we got it!**

SEGT has provided us with \$1000 to start us off. The condition of the funds was that we purchase at least one wicking garden bed. The idea of a wicking bed is that you prevent water from leaving the bottom of the bed with a waterproof liner or layer. This creates a water reservoir underneath the soil. Then, rather than having to irrigate by watering from above (via drip irrigation, a hose, watering can etc), the water literally wicks up into the soil from below, keeping it nice and moist. These beds are quite expensive so the plan for the \$1000 is to purchase two garden beds. However, we need your help!!



Where would be the best location in our school grounds for a vegetable garden? We

need to think about how much sun our veggies will need. Which way should our garden beds be facing? Is there a supply of water nearby? What type of vegetable should we try to grow? Next time you're on school grounds, have a look at some of the areas we have that don't get used for playing or sport. We also want to be able to see our garden so we don't forget about it!
